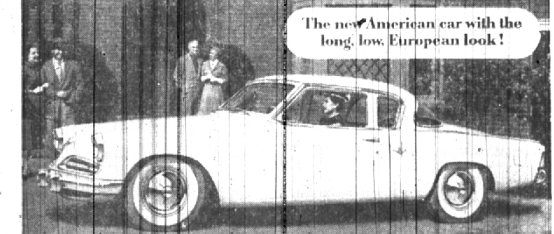

Panel Favors Lower Tariffs To Up Trade

Over a hundred area residents heard a panel of experts discuss world trade, tariff and the background on trade agreements dating back to 1950 and the Smoot-Hawley act at the Birmingham Community House April 18.

The program sponsored by the Birmingham League of Women Voters featured a panel composed of Attorney John C. Ray, specialist in customs law and chairman of the customs and import committee for the Detroit board of commerce; W. E. Pervez, vice president of Parks-Davis company's business operations; Eugene Haskin, instructor at the University of Detroit and manager of the investment department for the A. M. Heller company; The Rev. Raymond Jancuska, S.J., head of the department of foreign trade, university of Detroit; and William T. Hunt, district manager of the U.S. Chamber of Commerce.

THE GROUP brought out the advantages of stimulating world trade for the psychological value of other countries and the strengthening of customs law.

These advantages were supported by changes including the reduction of reciprocal trade agreements; facilitation of travel by elimination of complications and expense involved in import and export and minimizing the difficulty in obtaining visas for foreign travel.

The group also dwell on the importance of making convertibility possible and elimination of the blocked pound.

THEY ALSO pointed out that organized groups such as the League, women's organizations and merchants of Birmingham can do a great service by sponsoring similar discussion groups to create a broader understanding of free world trade.

The Rev. Jancuska, taking an opposite stand, "for the sake of discussion, presented many arguments in favor of 'protectionism'."

His policy called the importance of being self-sufficient as a nation, protecting our own farm and dairy products and the future scientific developments which would serve to make this country more self-sufficient.

Robert Deans, as moderator, summed up the findings of the panel, which specially recommended the reduction of tariffs.
