Adams PTA Slates Series 'First Grader in Profile'

"The First Grader in Profile" is the subject of a new three-meeting series sponsored by the Adams PTA. The first session was presented at eight o'clock Monday evening, April 20, by Mrs. William Salter, Birmingham school nurse, who discussed the physical outlines of the first grader, his endurance, typical ailments, and capacities.

Mrs. Helen Tewes of the University of Michigan Extension Service will discuss the emotional picture of the first grader at the second meeting Monday evening, April 27.

The final phase, a day at school, dealing with the academic problems of the first grader, will be presented on May 4 by a panel of Adams first grade teachers, Eleanor Featherstone, Adams principal, will outline the daily schedule with its allowances for the usual contingencies and interruptions.

Mrs. Thomas Monroe, retiring Adams PTA president, announces that similar sessions for parents of children in other critical grades are needed and that if this series is popular it will be repeated on other levels in the fall.

News Commentator Last Speaker Of Regular Season

Russell Barnes, Detroit News correspondent recently returned from United Nations sessions in New York, will address the final meeting of the season of the Ruth Shain club in international relations.

The class, which is open to the public, meets at ten o'clock Tuesday morning, April 28, at the Community House.

Barnes, a resident of Randall court, is noted for a special section of political news and has been with the News since before his graduation in 1924 from the University of Michigan.

Transferred to Paris in 1925, he covered Europe for six years for his paper. In 1934 Barnes served as Washington correspondent.

During the war Barnes was attached to the Office of War Information, first in New York and then abroad where one of his posts was head of press arrangements for the Cairo and Tehran conferences. In 1941 he was appointed director of psychological warfare for the Mediterranean area while continuing as head of O. W. I. activities.

Barnes commanded some 4,000 French, Italian and British civilian and military personnel in this phase of the war. On his return to Washington Barnes was awarded the War Department Exceptional Civilian Service Emblem.

Barnes has the varied background in the country and abroad for Tuesday morning's talk.
