Recreation Board Seeks Supervisors For Summer Work

Applications for playground and recreation supervisors are being taken by Frank Whitney for the Birmingham recreation board.
Whitney said probably between 15 and 20 persons would be employed for the summer program.
"We give our own examinations," he said, "having worked out our own system of scoring. The test is given on a basis of experience, education, and background.

Applicants may register at the board of education building and may take the examination whenever convenient.
WHITNEY SAID the summer program and the number of persons needed to supervise it would be arranged as soon as the recreation board is informed of its working budget.
"We cannot tell," Whitney said, "until city commissioners approve our budget, how broad a program we can handle. The plans are already made, of course, but we do not feel free to announce them in a tentative form."
