Hungarian Ex-Cabinet Member Here

Dr. Nicholas Nyaradi, last non-Communist member of the Hungarian Coalition government, will be the speaker at the annual breakfast meeting of the Ruth Sahn International Relations class Thursday, May 7, at the Community House.

Dr. Nyaradi, as Hungarian minister of finance, spent seven months in Hungary by a secret mission to the Politburo and obtaining reduction of a claim held by the Soviets against the Hungarian government. His May 7 topic is "Stalin's Last Will and Testament." His stay in the Russian capital gave Dr. Nyaradi an opportunity to observe Stalin's plans for economic and military progress, and the passing of the years have indicated how they are being carried out.

IN DECEMBER, 1948, Dr. Nyaradi resigned his post, protesting the expropriation of American property in Hungary by the Soviets. He and his wife fled the country and now reside in the United States with their three-year-old son Johnny.

Born in Budapest, Dr. Nyaradi studied economics, political science and law, receiving the degree of doctor of political science and doctor of law from the University of Budapest. After completing his studies he traveled extensively in Europe, North Africa, India, Ceylon, the United States and Canada.

For over fifteen years Dr. Nyaradi practiced law, and ultimately became an executive of one of Hungary's largest banks. In 1946 he was appointed undersecretary of the Hungarian treasury and, in 1947, he represented the strongly anti-Communist Small Farmers' Party in the minister of finance post. He was one of the two Hun-

garian cabinet ministers voting for Hungary's participation in the Marshall Plan.

DR. NYARADI was the leading figure in post-war Hungary's economic diplomacy, conducting negotiations with the governments of the United States, the Soviet Union, Great Britain, France, Switzerland, Sweden, Austria, Egypt, Czechoslovakia, Rumania, as well as the Allied Control Council of Germany and Austria.

Dr. Nyaradi arrived in this country in March, 1949. Since taking up the Saturday Evening Post, Fortune, The Reporter, Liberty, as well as news syndicates. He is the author of "My Ring-side Seat in Moscow," published by Thomas Y. Crowell, New York, in 1952.
