- Irish Cobbler (Early)
Katahoin (Medium Early)
Chippewa (Medium Early)
Sahago (Medium Early)
Pontiac Red (Late)
Rural Russet (Late) (Available later)

- NOTES ON POTATO GROWING
1. 40 lbs. of seed produce about 7 bushels
2. Loamy, friable soil is best
3. Cut potatoes so each piece has 1 or 2 eyes
4. Fertilize with 4-12-4 or 5-10-5 or 6-10-4
5. Plant 5" to 6" deep about 18 in. apart—cover 3 inches and as plants grow fill in trench
6. Plenty of water is needed
7. We will talk of sprays later
8. We will talk of harvesting much later

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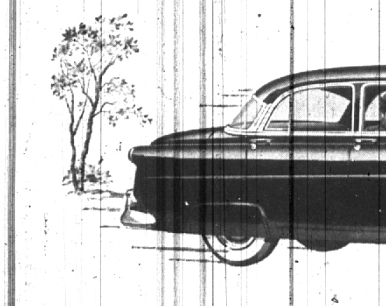
