'Super Market' Plan Is Adopted By Rummage Sale

Something new is included in the plans for the spring rummage sale sponsored each year by the Women's auxiliary of Christ Church Cranbrook. A "super market" plan will be put in operation which started last year April 30, from 10 a. m. to 3 p. m.

In the past it has been customary to buy for items in the rooms where purchased, check them there and go to the other section housing additional items.

Feeling that this created an unnecessary bottleneck, the committee in charge has arranged a single entrance and exit plan, with purchasers passing through checker and cashier stations on their way out of the building.

ENTRANCE WILL be made through the customary second floor of Cranbrook hotel, after which purchasers will go to the various rooms to select items. Checkers and cashiers will be stationed on the floor above, which will also provide the exit from the sale. All items, with the exception of toys, furniture and jewelry will be handled in this manner. These three classes of merchandise will be sold for where purchased.

Another innovation will be a refreshment stand, opening at 11 a. m. and closing at 3 p. m. in the church house. This service will be in charge of Mrs. Robert Frick assisted by the younger women of the church.
