

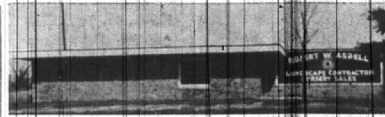
### Little Bigger Leaguers To Try Again Saturday

### Adams Widening Roll Confirmed

City commissioners Monday night confirmed the assessment roll for the widening and resurfacing of Adams from Lincoln to a point north of Buckingham, but agreed to talk further with abutting property owners to determine the location of a section of sidewalk on the west side of Adams, south of Hayes.

Sidewalk fronting five lots in this area will be too close to the street when widened and the city engineering department seeks to move it back to a safer distance.

Commissioners agreed that the improvement should be paid in three payments.

The foundation recently sponsored three nurses from that hospital to attend the polio work conference in Chicago out of which came plans for the institute in

Oakland county.

Carl W. Donaldson, chairman of the county chapter, said every step was being taken to provide specially trained nurses for polio patients.

HE POINTED out that after last year's polio epidemic, 348 new cases were recorded in Oakland county.

"We realize the need for locally trained nurses to care for polio patients," Donaldson said. "We do not know how hard polio will hit our area during the coming season, we are working now to be ready to meet whatever emergency arises. Good nursing care is most important for the recovery of these patients. We are making every effort to see it is available."

### Principals' Salary Schedule Approved

A new salary schedule for school principals in the Birmingham public school system has been approved by board of education members.

Elementary principals with the least amount of administrative experience will now start at \$5,727.50 and work to \$7,332 after 10 years. The highest paid principal who will be at the high school will start at \$8,658 with a high after 10 years of \$7,982.50.

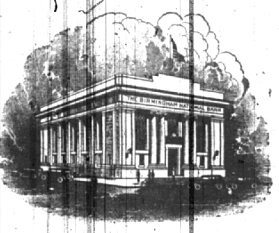
