

**Furnace and Cigaret Start 2 Small Fires**

A blow back from a delayed ignition in an automatic furnace and a spark from a cigarette are believed responsible for two fires which started within the city during the past week.

The furnace, in a service station at Woodward and Chapin, resulted in no fire damage but blew out three large plate glass windows.

Monday evening at the home of F. E. Wedge, 813 Smith, the fire was confined to an overstuffed chair, rug and door draping. Firemen believe the damage was caused by a cigarette spark.

Wedge told firemen the family had been away from home a short time and returned to find the fire smoldering. Damages are estimated at about \$150.

**City Won't Appeal Court's Decision**

The city will not participate in the appeal of a circuit court decision voiding a 1923 agreement between the city and a private owner for access across a city park.

Birmingham city commissioners made their determination Monday night in conjunction with an injunction granted by Judge George H. Harbeck against John H. Rosso prohibiting him from having access across park property at the south end of Hawthorne road.

The suit was brought by the subdivision, and the city was named as one of the defendants.

HOWEVER, commissioners told City Manager D. C. Eckert to continue negotiations with Rosso regarding a possible exchange of properties.

C. C. Patterson, attorney for Rosso, said an appeal will be taken to the supreme court regardless of what the city decided to do. If to higher court upholds the circuit court's decision, Patterson said Rosso will have a large claim for damages against the city.


