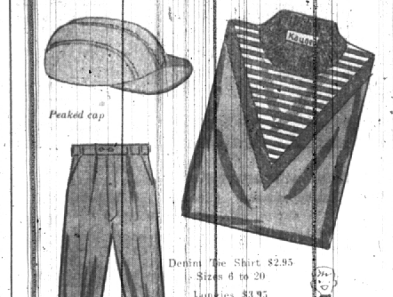


Summer Study Again Sponsored By B'ham Musicale

ADDITIONS will be held at Mrs. Tate's home at 3:15 p.m. Friday, May 15. Deadline for applications May 18.

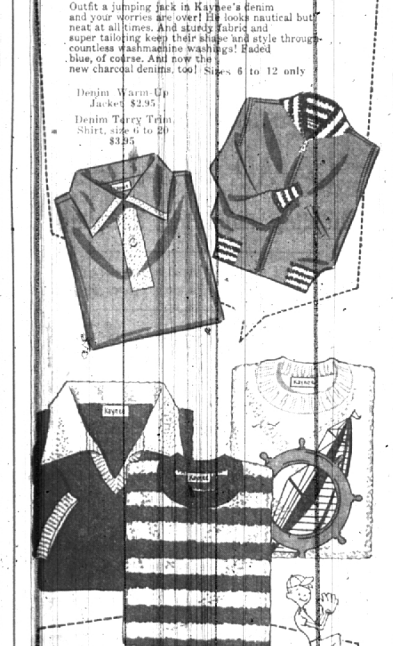
