### Annexation

**NO ACTION** on decision was made on the property north of Derby from Elm to Colledge. The city contends that property development of the area can only come with the extension of Derby.

Edgert stated that the boundary line was held to the center line of Derby road, provision for the division of utilities in the area should be made.

Edgert further stated that if the line were moved north to include the north tier of lots on Derby within the city, development of the area would be more economical.

Also discussed were properties south of Lincoln on the east and west sides of the Grand Trunk right-of-way. Birmingham owns the property east of the railroad but Troy still holds the land to the west.

**REBERT ASKED** that consideration be given by Troy members to annex this property to Birmingham so that the land could more easily be served by utilities and fire and police protection.

City officials believe that the property east of the railroad could be used for rubbish disposal for many years to come and that the present dump site on Maple avenue could be cleaned up and be more favorably used by either the township or the city.

Parties on both sides of the meeting commented that the meeting was in every way successful.

Supervisor Norman Barnard prefaced his statements on township problems by stating that former Troy board members were of the opinion that Birmingham was continually attempting to gobble up township lands.

"After meeting with you gentlemen and studying the progress so close to both communities, see no reason for any fear of such a suggestion," Barnard said.

Republican Romeo Marceau with 1598 votes defeated Donald J. Flynn, D., 118, for the highway commissioner's position.

ONLY 659 persons exercised their voting rights in Bloomfield township as no contests were inolved for township offices. A Republican slate was returned to office.

Supervisor David B. Anderson polled 592 votes, Clerk Robert Dudley, 574; Treasurer Aldo L. Hulst, 574; and Justice of the Peace Emer L. Sylvester, 565.

Albert A. Clark with 436 votes won the highway commissioner's position. He will fill the vacant trustee's seat.

Rhodes, 549; Russell W. C. Pickett, 559; William R. Rudell, 557; and James M. Martin, 502.

The highway commissioner's post went to Joseph A. Vetter with 554 votes. Edward R. Gifford gained the board of review position with 561 ballots.
