**B'ham AAUW To Hear Foreign Affairs Lecturer**

Henry C. Wolfe, expert on foreign affairs and author of three books, "The German Octopus," "Human Dynamite" and "The Imperial Soviets," will be the speaker of the day at the monthly luncheon meeting of the Birmingham branch of the American Association of University Women.

Also on the April 15 program at the Community House will be annual election of officers. Luncheon is to be served at 12:45 p.m. Wolfe's topic, "What's Happening in World Affairs," may very well prove prophetic as have many of his statements in the past. When lecturing at New York Town Hall on November 7, 1941, Wolfe warned his audience that the Japanese were planning a blitz attack! Pearl Harbor followed just a month later.

Earlier, in a June, 1939, article in Harper's Magazine, Wolfe forecast an alliance between Hitler and Stalin at a time when the two dictators were believed to be enemies. The axis was formed shortly afterwards.

Wolfe's experience in world affairs covers a thirty-five year span, beginning in the spring of 1917 when he organized the Andrew Anderson Unit and saw service on the French and Italian fronts as a member of American volunteers units. During the post-war era he served as a member of the Hoover commission in Soviet Russia.

After his experience in Russia, Wolfe continued to make annual trips abroad, endeavoring to interpret other countries to America as well as explaining America overseas. Brazil awarded him the Order of the Southern Cross in recognition of his efforts to further the Good Neighbor policy in Latin America.

COMMENTARY on Wolfe's record of forecasting events, Norman Cousins, editor of the Saturday Review of Literature, has said: "He has been right more often about big events than any other expert on foreign affairs that I know."
