## West Maple Paving Given Nod By City

Birmingham city commissioners have agreed to start preliminary work on the repaving of W. Maple between Linden and a point east of Glenhurst intersection. City officials will continue to study the possibility of carrying the new pavement to the city limits at Cranbrook.

Under the city's plan, the county would pay the costs of repaving the middle 20-foot strip of the roadway and also one-half of the drainage costs.

The county has expressed its willingness to establish a special assessment district on the north side of Maple for the property that lies outside of the city to help finance construction of the pavement in this area.
