



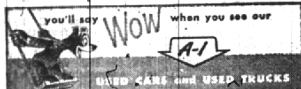

**City Not Interested In Requiring Use Of Home Incinerators**

Birmingham's garbage disposal method came up before the city commission Monday night in the form of a suggestion from the Incinerator Products Company of Detroit that the city should conduct a campaign and possibly adopt legislation to require the use of individual home incinerators in new homes.

The company claimed the use of incinerators would greatly decrease the load on the city's garbage disposal facilities.

In opposing the suggestion Commissioner Charles Renteria stressed that the city has already given long and serious consideration to the problem of garbage disposal and that present plans of the Southeastern Oakland County Garbage and Rubbish Authority seem adequate to meet the situation.

City Manager Donald F. Egbert stated that most municipalities feel that the matter of installing incinerators should be left up to the voluntary effort of individuals.

**Michael Welch, Businessman, Dies Suddenly**

C. Michael Welch, 55, of 1773 Villa road, former Plymouth Chrysler dealer here, died Aug. 19 at new Graces hospital, Detroit, after a brief illness.

Mr. Welch had had a long career in the automotive field, working in technical and retail sales capacities.

He began his association with the Hupp Motor company, leaving there for a technical position with Liberty Motors. He had also been associated with the Paige and DeSoto companies and had been with dealerships in Buffalo and Rochester, N. Y.

He left the automotive field briefly when he was associated with Curtiss-Wright in Buffalo, leaving there in 1942 to join the Chrysler Corporation. He held technical and sales positions with this company.

IN 1949 HE joined the Wilson-Welch dealership here, taking over as Mike Welch, Inc., in 1950. He sold the business last June to the Keller-Koch company. He was manufacturer's representative for Alko Industries at Hazel Park at the time of his death.

Mr. Welch was born Jan. 30, 1898, at Rockford, Ill. He came to Birmingham from Detroit two years ago.

He was a member of the Holy Name parish here, Pontiac Elks, BPOE 810, Knights of Columbus

in Buffalo, the Rockford American Legion and the Forty and Eight group of that city.

He is survived by his widow, Eida M., of Birmingham; three brothers, Joseph T., and Raymond A., of Rockford and Robert J., of Hyattsville, Md.

THE BODY will be taken from the William Sullivan and Son Funeral home in Royal Oak this evening to Rockford. Tentative arrangements have been made for services and burial there on Saturday morning.
