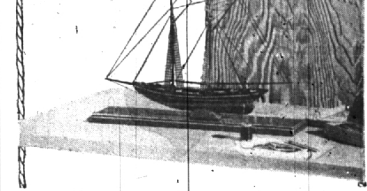
Vandalism Prompts Insurance Policy

Birmingham board of education members Tuesday night acted to purchase vandalism insurance to cover any future damage to school board property.

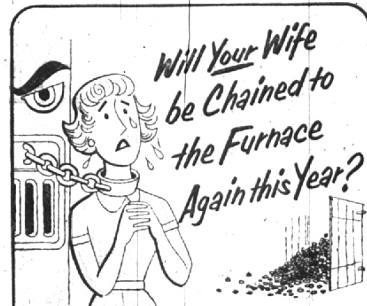
Destruction of school property that has plagued school officials in nearby communities also has become a problem here in the city. Board members, fearful of further attacks on the schools, approved the purchase of the vandalism policy that will cost the district \$1,250 for three years' coverage.

SUPERINTENDENT Doctor Dwight B. Ireland reported to board members that recent damage included \$142 to Barrington school, \$55 to the high school and \$9 at Quanton.

Ireland stated that Birmingham police had apprehended the youths responsible for the attacks on the three schools and that the parents would be liable for the damages.
