In Detroit the society maintains a home to give temporary shelter to neglected or mistreated children that would otherwise be left to juvenile detention homes or sent to their own homes. In addition to caring for their physical wants, members look to the things of the spirit, taking the children on excursions, to the circus, and often to their own homes for the day.

THE BIRMINGHAM chapter directs their efforts toward the children at the Sarah Fisher Home on Inkster road, devoting hours each week to brightening the youngsters' day.

Members of both units annually provide tagetes for indigent mothers so that the children may at least have a decent start in life. Funds to maintain their activities are raised at The Clothes Closet, a resale shop run by the society in Detroit, and an annual fall event.
