Belle of the ball frocks are styled for young careers and college students in both rich, formal cottons and sturdy cottons, reports the National Fashion Council.

Two silhouette trends are seen—the slim sheath and the youth fully full-skirted design.

SEPARATE SKIRTS and tops vie for top honors with one-piece frocks. Well-known designers have found inspiration in the richness of velveteens, the richness of denim, the cotton flannels printed in exotic hand-screened designs.

A black velveteen cocktail coat is a formal type of coverup for date sheaths. One designer makes a date sheath, then creates it with embroidery done in rich paisley pattern.

Other velveteen sheaths are left unadorned but act as smart foils for jewelry accessorizing.

DATE SKIRTS are shown in a variety of cottons. Quilted corduroy printed with floral motifs is used for a full skirt and worn with either a halter top or short-sleeved blouse in contrasting colored velveteen.

Brail embroidery and cotton flannel create a vivid orange-evening skirt in velveteen worn with a black halter.

Business To Pay Share Of Maple Road Widening

Birmingham city commissioners have altered their stand of a week ago on the financing of the West Maple widening between Linden and So. Glenhurst.

Monday night they approved a 50 per cent assessment against commercial property owners along the proposed improved stretch of pavement. The assessment will be levied to pay for the widening of the slab beyond the middle 20-foot width of the pavement.

Assessments will not include costs of drainage structures or curbing.

CITY ASSESSOR Elmer Haack reported to commissioners that the widening would benefit business property and residential land, and stated that improvements on West Maple previously had been paid for in share by business frontages.

Commissioners last week determined that no portion of the improvement would be paid by special assessment.
