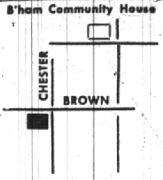

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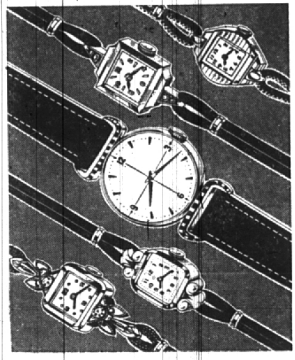

The couple are honeymooning in Northern Michigan. They will return to make their home at East Lansing where the groom is a student at Michigan State College.

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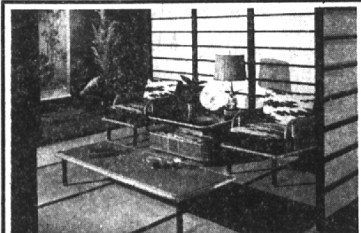
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
