Burke E. Cusney, 46, of 1099 Cranbrook road, Bloomfield Village, died Wednesday night, Dec. 2, at New Grace hospital, Detroit, after a short illness.

Born Nov. 2, 1909. In Detroit, Mr. Cusney lived all his life there with the exception of the last three years in Bloomfield Village.

He was a vice-president and general manager of the Butler Paper Company of Detroit and had worked in graphic arts for the past 25 years.

Mr. Cusney was a member of the Detroit Athletic club and the Adcraft club.

HE IS SURVIVED by his wife, Mrs. Pauline Hubler Cusney; three children, Burke, Barbara, and Bonnie, all at home; his mother, Mrs. Elizabeth Cusney; three brothers, Raymond, Roger, and Thomas; and two sisters, Mrs. Jay Whitley and Mrs. Ralph Conlon. DENNIS FISHER STRONG, 79, died Friday morning at the home of his son, Dr. Norman H. Strong, 53 Oakland, after a brief illness. Born Dec. 29, 1873, in Madison, Mich., Mr. Strong lived most of his life in Detroit. For the past several years he lived at his home at 8950 Gale road, Pontiac.

He held a bachelor of science degree from the Detroit Institute of Technology and had attended Hillsdale College.

Mr. Strong was retired from an active career in YMCA work. He had been inter-city secretary of the Detroit YMCA and previously was secretary of that organization in Adrian, Jackson and Battle Creek. He was the organizer of the Western Branch of the Detroit YMCA and was its first secretary.

His one-time trustee on the board of Adrian college, he was later vice-president of the Michigan Parent-Teacher association and president of the Detroit council of PTA association.

He was chairman of the board of the Lake Louise Christian community, a charter member of the West Side Exchange club, and past-president of the Detroit Exchange club No. 1. He was also a member of other fraternal organizations.

A member of the First Methodist church of Pontiac, Mr. Strong was active in church affairs. He was lay-leader of the Detroit conference of the Methodist church and member of the Detroit jurisdictional conference of the church.

Besides Dr. Strong, he is survived by another son, Homer D. of Detroit; two sisters, Mrs. Emma Jenkins of Detroit, and Mrs. Grace Wilson of Coleman; seven grandchildren and two great-grandchildren.

Funeral services were held Monday from the Chapel of the William R. Hamilton Company, 3976 Cass, Detroit, with cremation following at Evergreen cemetery.

HENRY G. MIKOLOWSKI, 80, of 961 Lovell, Troy township, died suddenly Sunday of a heart attack.

Factory Damaged By Fire in Troy

Troy township firemen battled for 45 minutes late Tuesday evening to bring a fire under control at the Turn-A-Grip Fishing Rod Company's factory at 4114 Crooks road.

According to Fire Chief Elmer Schroeder, the owner, Clyde Kolb, estimated the loss would run between \$10,000 and \$20,000.
