Cost of combatting the disease is negligible in face of the ultimate cost if the disease is allowed to run rampant, the group states.

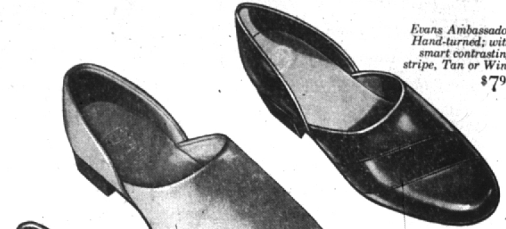

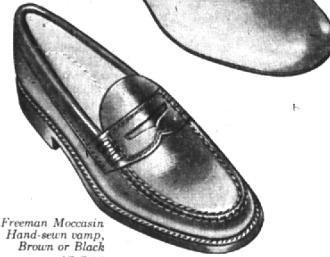

Oakland County Foresters Name LeBold Chairman

William LeBold, Birmingham City forester, was elected chairman of the Oakland County Foresters Association at a meeting of the group in Pontiac, Dec. 1.

LeBold has been forester for the city since 1950. He came here from the Hartzell Industries of Ohio where he worked as company forester following his graduation from the University of Michigan in 1948.

Elected to serve with LeBold as officers of the association were Vice-Chairman Lawrence Westfall, superintendent of parks and grounds for Royal Oak, and Secretary William Aho, Pontiac city forester.

A campaign to gain the support of every community in southeastern Michigan in its crusade against Dutch Elm disease has been undertaken by the Oakland County Foresters following the meeting.

THE GROUP is circulating a resolution that it hopes the local governing unit of all southeastern communities will adopt and send to its representative in the state legislature at Lansing.

to be allocated to the State department of Agriculture to provide for the enlarging of present laboratory and personnel facilities offered by the State in locating, identifying and removing this disease (Dutch Elm), so that every possible pre-
