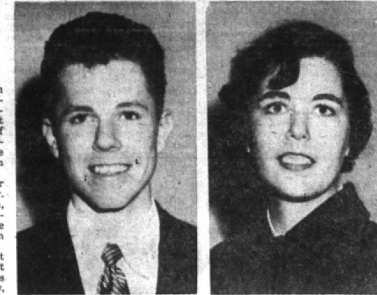

Two Birmingham teen-agers won the acclaim of more than 300 fellow members of Junior Achievement of Southeastern Michigan last week and were elected to offices of the Achievers Association, an organization made up of the more than 3,500 boys and girls active in JA in this area.

Jack Garvey, 17, and his sister Sally, 16, son and daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Garvey, 452 Furlan, were elected president and recording secretary, respectively, at the initial meeting of the Association for JA's 1953-54 program year.

Both youngsters joined JA last October when the program first opened in Birmingham. Jack is also president of his JA company, Compac Table Co., which is sponsored by the Wabek State Bank Monday nights at the local JA, business center located in the Birmingham Theater building.

Sally holds the office of secretary in Panda Products Co., a JA firm which operates at the business center on Thursday nights under the sponsorship of the Birmingham Eccentric.

SHE IS A sophomore at Birmingham High school and her brother, Jack, is a senior at the University of Detroit High school in Detroit.

Building Inspector J. V. Walker is preparing information regarding smoke abatement ordinances in other municipalities so we will have the necessary data should the city commission decide the city should enact a new smoke abatement ordinance," the manager explained.

HE ADDED that if the city is unable to obtain the desired degree of cooperation from building owners to keep the smoke nuisance to a minimum, "it would appear there is no alternative other than the adoption of a modern ordinance and its enforcement."

The city's present smoke ordinance was adopted in the late 1920's, according to the city manager.
