

City Last Signee On Troy Parcel

All parties except the City of Birmingham have signed contracts which will permit development of a parcel of Troy township land north of Derby and east of Eton. City commissioners Monday night authorized signature of the contract with the stipulation that the city and the township come to an agreement on sewage rights in the Derby road sewer.

Development of the property will assure an early start on construction of the urgently-needed Pembroke elementary school, a new school approved in last year's Birmingham school district \$3,000,000 bond issue but delayed because of lack of services to the school site.

THE BIRMINGHAM Development company, Frank Gobel corporation, the Detroit Presbyterian reassemblies and Troy township signed the agreement last week which will provide for the construction of the sewer, water lines and street paving in the property at the property owner's expense.

Troy Supervisor Norman Barnard stated that the four parties have deposited the necessary sum for the engineering work involved. Work is expected to start immediately in the area as soon as all contracts have been cleared.

The city seeks to exchange sewage rights for sanitary flow through the city from the property, for the flow of city storm water through the Derby road water sewer.

City To Approve Proposed Zoning On Porritt Land

Final approval of proposed zoning on the Porritt property was given the land owners Monday night when city commissioners viewed comparison bids of an outside contractor for garbage pickup during 1954 with figures submitted by the DPW.

The city now collects rubbish with an outside firm handling the garbage pickup.

ALTERNATE BIDS included costs for picking up garbage at the curb and also at the rear of the house.

Commissioners questioned whether the city might better be able to do the entire job after studying the indirect costs involved in the garbage contracts.

The B and B Disposal company's bid was below that of the DPW, but commissioners agreed to wait another week before awarding the contract so that they could get a clearer picture of all costs involved in the city's collection.

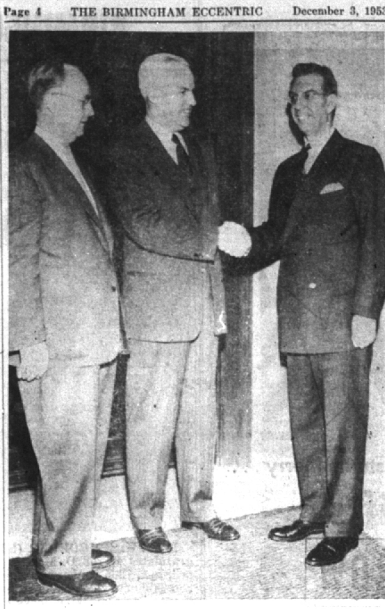
