Men and Machines Ready To Face Winter's Blasts

"The north wind shall blow, and we shall have snow. What will the poor robin do then?" Why he'll go south, of course.

But, the majority of Birmingham residents must stay around to face the rigors of winter weather. To make their lot less miserable, the city's department of public works has been getting its street clearing apparatus in shape to be ready for the first real snowfall.

The city's oil truck, retired from its summer duties of laying dust on city streets, has been fitted with a steel blade and stands in readiness to push snow off those same streets.

A heavy gravel truck, still going about its fair weather business of hauling gravel while equipped with a snow plow mount, is ready to dash to the DPW garage and pick up its blade when the first blizzard strikes.

To KEEP the ice off the street, Robert Kenning, head of the DPW, has made arrangements to assure the city of plenty of salt to scatter on the slick spots. One hundred tons of salt, last

has directed the reconditioning of the city's salt spreaders, and reports them ready to go.

Small tractors for use in removing snow from park walks and parking areas at the municipal building have been rigged with their winter driver's compartments. One is set with a snow blade, and the other equipped with its heavy duty broom for sweeping snow.

The department is prepared for hauling snow out of the downtown section with its winter equipped loader.

Willard Brown, foreman of the street department, is prepared to direct the department's operations when the first heavy snowfall comes.

KENNING STATES that because of many calls received last year, he would like to make it known that the city has no facilities for removing snow from walks in residential areas.

"The cost of personnel and equipment to undertake such an operation would be prohibitive," explained Kenning.

year's surplus, lays in a pile in a corner of the department's garage. More salt, 500 tons, has been contracted for and when needed will be brought from the International salt mines of Detroit.

The city's bill for salt this year is expected to reach \$3,560. The salt is bought at \$7.70 a ton, and is delivered in 20 to 25 ton loads by commercial carriers at a cost of \$1.20 per ton.

"Delivery by commercial carriers costs us much less than trying to bring the salt up with our small trucks," said Kenning.

The Director of Conservation, having made a thorough investigation of conditions relative to Hungarian partridge, and in view of the fact that the same are a class of game birds.
Therefore, the Conservation Commission, by authority of Act 236, P. A. 1923, hereby orders that for a period of five years from October 1, 1934, it shall be unlawful for any person to hunt, take, or attempt to hunt, take, or kill any Hungarian partridge in the state.

STATE OF MICHIGAN—ORDER OF THE CONSERVATION COMMISSION, REGULATING FISHING IN CERTAIN WATERS.

The Conservation Commission, by authority of Act 236, P. A. 1923, as amended, hereby orders that for a period of one year from January 1, 1934, it shall be unlawful, except as hereinafter provided, to take or attempt to take fish in the following waters:
Harrisville hatchery pond (2) between Adams and Harrisville, Adams County.
Alcona County: Section 19, T 4 N, R 4 W, and Coe's Pond, Section 21, T 3 N, R 4 W, W. Barry County.
Berrien County Sportsmen's Club Pond, Section 24, T 5 N, R 14 W, Berrien County.
White Lake Pond, Sections 8 and 9, T 3 N, R 10 W, Calhoun County.
Bull Lake, Section 23, T 5 N, R 11 W, Clinton County.
Craws Pond, Section 22, T 20 N, R 12 W, Grand Traverse County.
Tomb's Mill Pond and the Hillsdale State Fish Rearing Ponds, Section 25, T 4 S, R 10 W, Hillsdale County.
T 4 S, R 10 W, Hillsdale County.
Ionia Ponds (2), Section 30, T 7 N, R 6 W, Ionia County.
Guller Pond, Section 9, T 22 N, R 6 E, Ionia County.

1. Fishing shall be lawful during the statutory trout season.
2. Except on Guller Pond fishing shall be limited to the period from one hour before sunrise to one hour after sunset.
3. On the Guller Pond fishing shall be limited to the period from 12:00 noon to 12:00 midnight except on Saturdays, Sundays, and holidays when it shall be permitted from 6:00 A. M. to 12:00 midnight.
4. Artificial flies only may be used.
5. No insect or raft shall be placed or used on the ponds or streams.
6. The daily limit shall be ten trout except that in Crown, Guller, Pavement, Solon, and Manistee ponds it shall be five trout or ten pounds and one trout.
7. On Ponds Nos. 1 and 2 at the Hillsdale State Fish Rearing Ponds and on Guller Pond, each angler shall make a daily fishing report on forms provided at the ponds.
