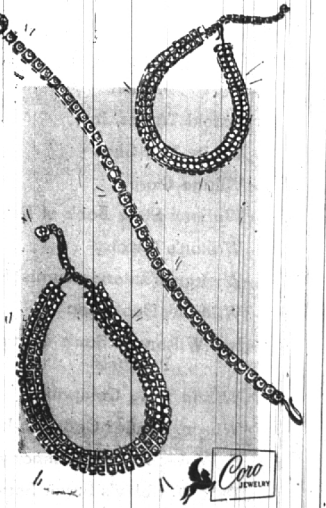

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Asks Employers To Use Care in Recording Data

Over 6,000 employees in the Oakland County area file quarterly tax returns under social security.

Rex A. C. Atwood, manager of the Pontiac social security office, says the successful administration of the law which pays benefits based on past earnings on which social security taxes are paid is due to a great extent to the cooperative attitude of employers in submitting tax returns which are complete as to name of employee, his correct social security account number and the amount of wages paid to him.

There are some employers, however, who according to Atwood, can contribute to efficiency in administration of the law by using a little care in recording social security account numbers of their employees exactly as shown on their social security cards.

SINCE the social security account of a person determines his eligibility to benefits for himself and his family, as well as the amounts of these benefits, it is very important that the account be correct, Atwood said.

Reporting wages without a social security account number or under the wrong name or number results in need for correspondence or contact with the employer to identify the report adding to expense of administration.

An employee can help in assuring proper credit of his wages to his account by showing his social security card to his employer when accepting employment. Applications for social security account number cards may be obtained at any post office or the social security office. In Pontiac the social security office is located at 18 South Parry Street, Room 322, Hubbard Building.

ATWOOD SUGGESTED that it is advisable for each person to compare the account number shown on his own records, such as payroll receipts, tax withholding statement, etc. with the social security number shown on the account number card. If there is a discrepancy, he should get it corrected, otherwise he may not receive full credit for such earnings.

Atwood reiterated that a worker may check on his social security account at any time. He should do this at least once every three years. If he does not agree with the amount reported to him by the Social Security Administration, he should take his own records and his wage statement to the social security office for assistance in getting the account reconciled. A simple post card for requesting a statement of the wages recorded on an individual's social security account is available at the Social Security Office and will be furnished free upon request. Atwood said.
