**Fried Apple Pie**  
2 cups flour  
1 teaspoon baking powder  
1 teaspoon salt  
2 tablespoons shortening  
1 egg yolk  
4 tablespoons sugar  
1/2 cup milk  
Thick apple sauce, well seasoned with cinnamon and nutmeg

Sift baking powder and salt with flour. Work in shortening. Combine egg, sugar and milk. Stir into flour mixture. Roll out on a floured board to 1/4 inch thick. Cut into rounds about 4 to 5 inches in diameter. Spread thick apple sauce, well seasoned with cinnamon and nutmeg, half of crust, fastening the edges with a fork. Fry in deep fat heated to 350 degrees or until an inch of bread browns in 60 seconds. Drain on absorbent paper. Sprinkle with powdered sugar.
