County Unit Sponsors Lecture Here Dec. 7

Former chaplain of the United States House of Representatives, and only woman to ever hold this post, Mrs. Annalee Stewart will address an open meeting of the Oakland county branch of the Women's International League for Peace and Freedom here on Dec. 7. The meeting will be at 8 p.m. in the First Methodist church, West Maple.

Mrs. Stewart, mother, minister, lecturer, and lobbyist, is national legislative secretary of the League in Washington. She will tell her audience that the League is willing to assume the responsibility for leadership toward world co-operation and peace, stating flatly that "war is not inevitable."

She received her degree from Illinois Wesleyan university in 1921 and has since done graduate work at Boston University School of Theology, Colgate-Rochester divinity school and Union Theological seminary in New York City. She is one of the first women to be ordained as a minister in the Methodist church.

FOR A FOUR year period, beginning in 1946, she served as president of the United States section of the League, a group whose aim is to establish, by democratic methods, those political, economic and psychological conditions which will insure the rights of man and bring peace to the world.

Mrs. Stewart has been active in the field of religion and education for many years, stressing boy and girl relationships, teacher-training, devotional life and social issues.

She has directed girls' and young adult activities for the Conference on Religion Education at Northfield, Mass., and has been head counselor for several young peoples' institutes in various states.

She has fulfilled other religious and educational obligations.

In Washington, as a lobbyist, she is daily in contact with governmental leaders which give her a broad background of factual information from which to speak.

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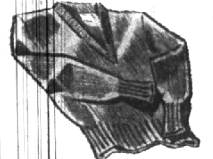
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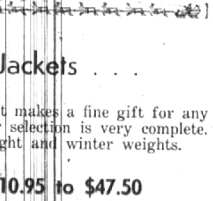
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
