


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
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World News of the Week

Crane Wrestlers Lose To Lansing

A powerful East Lansing High School wrestling team downed Cranbrook School at East Lansing last Friday night by a score of 31-11. With one of its entries already pitted over Ann Arbor and Lansing, Sexton High School's East Lansing team had to turn to its reserves to the tune of 10 in the state.

Cranbrook was handicapped by illnesses and injuries which left the Blue and Grey facing stiff competition with Ann Arbor, Hayes, Rockwood, and Westland, all of whom to the sidelines and Captain Webb slowed by a serious ear injury.

A defaced and a pin placed Cranbrook ten-pointing arm at the outset of the meet, but Tom Berry made a bid to put the Cranes back into the show by flattening his man. Captain Webb gamely tried to even the score in the first high match while Jack Foster also dropped a three pointer to give East Lansing the lead; they held all the way.

MARY AMBROSIO earned a decision and Bill Dondero talked his fifth straight match. Doug Richmond won on a default to end a glorious afternoon for the Cranes. In the final bout, Captain Webb and Grey were forced virtually to concede to the team from the home town of 21 of the 30 points they required. The one bright side of the match for the Blue and Grey was Dondero who remained the Cranbrook leader in points for the year with 17. Ivan Booka and Mary Davison won him with 10 points with one match remaining this year against Western Reserve on Saturday, March 7.

Crane Reserves Lose Close One To Patterson

The Junior Cranes failed on Wednesday, Feb. 18, in a valiant attempt to avenge an earlier five point loss to the Patterson College team. The Cranes lost the second basketball game at the Windsor, Ontario, school by a 43-42 score.

The game was not decided until the closing seconds when Patterson capitalized on two free throws and held a one-point edge as the game ended. The Cranes' effort was again stymied by Patterson, who led off to a 14-5 lead in the first quarter. The Blue and Grey's shooting caught fire and guard Jack Baggadie took advantage of the long range and half-time found the Cranes one point shy of the lead.

Throughout the last half, the lead changed frequently. The Cranbrook doubled a field goal to the Patterson cause when Crane Center Bob Reed hoped to stop a shot in mid-air but instead had to entangle with the net automatically giving the opposition two points.

Cranbrook Downs Patterson Cagers


