Cranbrook Scientist Weds In Near East

Suzannah Beck Vaillant of Littleton, N.H., and Dr. Robert T. Hatt, director of the Cranbrook Institute of Science, Bloomfield Hill, were married Saturday noon in St. George's Church, Baghdad, Iraq.

The marriage was announced by the bride's father, Emam Beck of Mexico City and Tucson, Ariz.

Mrs. Vaillant, widow of archaeologist Dr. George C. Vaillant, flew from New York via London and Amsterdam to join Dr. Hatt who is on leave from the Cranbrook Institute to engage in a study of the mammals of Iraq and act as consultant to the Iraq Museum of Natural History.

THE NEW MRS. Hatt was born in Mexico City where her father was for many years president of the Mexico City Banking Corporation. She attended the Spence School in New York City and Vassar College.

In 1930 she married Dr. Vaillant, then associate curator of Mexican archaeology of the American Museum of Natural History in New York, and at various times during his career a member of the teaching staffs of Harvard, Yale, Columbia and New York Universities, and of the University of Pennsylvania where he was professor of anthropology and director of the University Museum at the time of his death in 1945.

Mrs. Vaillant has translated selected poems of Stephen Vincent Benet into Spanish, and "The Xenan Way" by Eudocio Ravines

into English. In addition to her literary work she is active in cultural enterprises and was instrumental in organizing upper New Hampshire for General Eisenhower.

She has three children; Mrs. Ellis Settle of New York City; George Vaillant, Harvard sophomore; and Henry Vaillant, a junior at Phillips Exeter Academy.

DR. HATT, a native of Lafayette, Ind., received his education at the University of Michigan and Columbia University.

After teaching biology at New York University for five years, he became assistant curator of mammalogy in the American Museum of Natural History, where he and his late wife, Marcella Bolgreen Hatt, also a staff member, were associated with Dr. and Mrs. Vaillant.

In 1935 Dr. Hatt was appointed director of the Cranbrook Institute of Science. He has two sons; Richard K. Hatt, stationed with the Air Force at Del Rio, Texas; and Peter K. Hatt, Michigan State College freshman.

DR. AND MRS. Hatt will be at home in Milles House, Academy Road, Cranbrook, after April 15.
