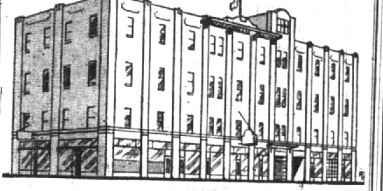
Wayne Professor To Address PTA
