Rotarians Hear Library Needs

Rotarians Monday noon heard Baldwin Public Librarian Jeanne Lloyd outline the needs of the Birmingham library and the reasons behind the charter amendment to be submitted to the voters in the April 6 election.

In stating that the library's present budget is inadequate, Miss Lloyd explained that the number of borrowers had jumped 170 per cent in the past 10 years while the circulation of books is up 78 per cent.

While most cities usually carry 40 per cent of the population on their registration rolls, Birmingham has 85 per cent registered, Miss Lloyd said.

ACCORDING TO national standards, she said, the Birmingham library should have between 50,000 to 70,000 books. The library now has only 40,000.

Adding that only 2 employees have been added to the staff in the past 10 years, she stated that salaries were higher in every nearby community but one.

Presbyterian Five Takes League Lead

Running up the highest point total of the year, the First Presbyterian church quartet defeated First Baptist church 85 to 34 in the Birmingham YMCA Church league last week to take over first place in the league.

Don Keener scored 32 points for the Presbyterianists while all players on the Red and White figured in the scoring. Buck Owens 16 points paced the offense of First Baptist.

Redeemer Lutheran started slowly behind Christ church and were behind for two quarters of play then freed Pete Wexly and Jack Strub for repeated lay-up shots in the second half to win 47 to 40.

The win preserved the Lutheran's hold on third place in the Y league standings.

Managers of the church league are asked to meet at the Y House, 400 East Lincoln, Monday, Jan. 26, to draw up the schedule for the second half and to determine representatives to the district play-offs. All contracts and attendance sheets must be turned in at this meeting.

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Russian Y Leader To Talk Here

Mr. and Mrs. Nicholas T. Goncharoff, Russian refugees and citizens-to-be of the United States, will visit Birmingham, Monday, Jan. 26, and appear before three groups.

In the morning, they will address the students of Birmingham High School where Mr. Goncharoff will challenge the students to be alert to combat the communistic scourge that threatens the world. Both he and his wife will participate in the question and answer period that follows.

At noon the couple will be guests of the Birmingham Rotary Club where Mr. Goncharoff will speak of life behind the curtain.

In the afternoon, Mrs. Leslie Schaefer, 120 Hawthorne, will play tea in honor of Mrs. Goncharoff for a group of people interested in foreign relations.

That evening the Goncharoffs are to speak in Royal Oak. They return on Tuesday night, Jan. 27.

In addition, the Men's Club of the First Methodist Church, like most young Russians, the Goncharoffs had never seen life beyond the borders of the Soviet Union, nor been exposed to Western thought, until World War II interrupted down the Iron curtain.

In 1941 Mr. Goncharoff was mobilized in the Tank Corps and one year later was captured by the German Army.

Interned at first in a prisoner-of-war camp in Ukraine, he was moved in February, 1942, to a forced-labor camp in Germany.

Early in 1945, in Bavaria, he was liberated by the American army.

After regaining freedom, Goncharoff made his way to Munich and in November of that same year entered the University of Munich as a teacher and student. Six years later, in 1952, he received a Ph.D. in philosophy and history.

GONCHAROFF was part of the Russian YMCA movement during most of his days in Munich. His first YMCA contacts came in 1946 in refugee camps, and in 1948 he became President of the YMCA for Russians in West Germany. At the same time he served as Secretary of the Russian Student Christian Movement and was a member of the Executive Board of the YMCA-YWCA in Munich.

He has represented the Russian YMCA at international conferences in Switzerland, Denmark, and France. From 1950 to 1952 he directed the Y's Leadership Training Program in the American and French Zones of Germany. He also attended the United Nations Assembly meeting in Paris.

Both the Goncharoffs were born in Russia. The parents were victims of the Revolution. When drafted into the Russian Army in 1941, Mr. Goncharoff was a student of history and philosophy at the University of Odessa.

He is a skilled musician, and has studied political science, sociology, psychology, international law, and journalism.

The Free Russian Youth Club, of which he was Director, is an organization of Russian youth who have escaped the tyranny of the Soviet regime and are now living in the United States. Its purpose is to help these Russian Youth adjust to American life.

Well Drilling Ends At Walnut Lk. School

O. O. Corsaut, Oak Park contractor, has finally struck what is termed "an extremely good" water source on Walnut Lake school property, according to School Superintendent Dwight Ireland.

Well drillers reached a depth of 235 feet before finding the water for the six-inch well. Installation of a new pressure pump is expected to produce 80 gallons of water per minute for average use and this may be increased in the event of fire.

The proposed cost figures for the well were set at \$4,200, but have now exceeded \$6,000, because water was located at a level deeper than originally anticipated.

City Is Invited To Join Proposed Teletype Network

City Manager Donald C. Egbert has been asked to prepare a report for Birmingham city commissioners on the advisability of joining the proposed teletype network for law enforcement agencies in Oakland county.

County supervisors last September adopted a resolution calling for the establishment of this network.

The resolution would appropriate \$18,000 as the county's share provided eight municipalities join the network. Should this fail, the funds will remain in the county's contingent fund.

Supervisors advised Birmingham officials that it would take about six months to install such a system and asked that they file any intention to join not later than Feb. 2, 1953.

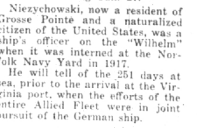

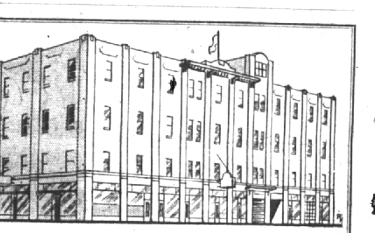
He will tell of the 251 days at sea, prior to the arrival at the Virginia port, when the efforts of the entire Allied Fleet were in joint pursuit of the German ship.
