Maple reserves proved they could bounce back, returning to the victory column last Friday evening on the local floor against Hazel Park 40-36.

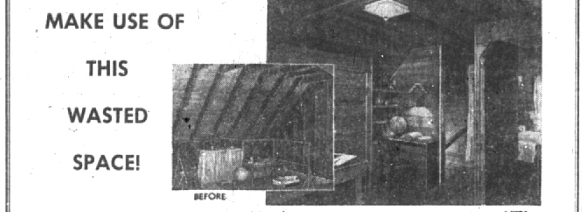
