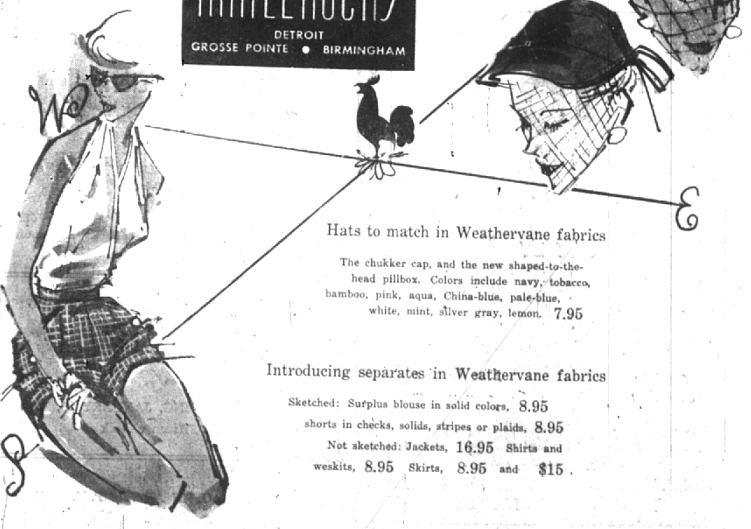

## February Class Is Offered For Untrained Volunteers

Opportunities for persons who have an hour or two a week to give to working with children and adults in Red Feather agencies can join the class for new volunteers to be conducted by the Central Volunteer Bureau of United Community Services beginning the first week of February.

Men and women who have been hesitant to volunteer for work in settlements and community houses because they felt that they were not prepared to work with children and adults, will be given training one night a week for four weeks. The class hours will be from 7:30 to 9:30 one evening a week to be arranged to satisfy the volunteers.

Instructors will include Miss Mary Lee Nicholson of the School of Social Work, Wayne University; Miss Edith Edwards, director of coordinated leadership education for Girl Scouts, Camp Fire Girls and Y-Teens; Mrs. Jane Costabile, director of Grosse Pointe Woods Community Club; Virgil Brown, associate director, division of older children and adolescents, Merrill-Palmer School; and Mrs. Beulah Whitby, assistant director, Mayor's Interracial Committee.

THE GENERAL THEME of the classes will be the ways to work with groups of children and adults. Special emphasis will be on group relationships, interracial understanding, activities, inter-cultural relations and general orientation to recreational services.

NO special skills are required. A liking for children and people is far more important than any special talents. Many volunteer jobs are limited to cooking, sewing, or conducting group games.

Some specific requests for volunteers include nursery assistants and leaders for old peoples clubs at settlement houses; teacher for sewing class at community centers; instructor for girls' basketball class, swimming instructor, craft instructor, art instructor, dancing teacher, tumbling instructor, stamp club leader, recreational activities for children in hospitals including reading to children, cut-outs and coloring, games, crafts; infant feeding, and hospital work in laboratories, kitchens, clerical work, sewing, making beds, helping patients.

All these requests call only for persons interested in helping. No special training is needed in any case. Jobs are located in all sections of the city, and in most cases, jobs can be found in the neighborhood in which the volunteer lives.

THIS IS A wonderful opportunity for men and women who find that they want something more in their everyday existence. Nearly 10,000 men and women in the Metropolitan Area are doing volunteer work. The satisfactions derived from serving others cannot be described. It is only necessary to point out that many people have been doing volunteer work for a quarter of a century or more and are looking forward to many more years of enjoying their relationships with the children and adults who need their help.

People who would like to join this volunteer class can do so by calling the Central Volunteer Bureau of United Community Services at the Red Feather number, Temple 1-1600. The classes will be limited to enrollment and volunteers will be accepted in order of application. Applications will be accepted up to January 27, 1953.
