Design of Hills Sculptor En Route to London Judging

Gabriel Kohn, scholarship student at Cranbrook Academy of Art, has been selected as one of 80 sculptors from all parts of the world to compete for a grand prize of approximately \$15,000, offered by the London Institute of Contemporary Arts for designs on the theme, "The Unknown Political Prisoner."

Kohn has received a \$200 prize for being among eleven sculptors chosen by a jury to represent North America in the international contest. His design, done at Cranbrook, will be on exhibit with the other winners at the Museum of Modern Art in New York for ten days, after which it will be shipped to London.

Now studying at Cranbrook on the George G. Booth scholarship which he won in competition with two hundred other applicants, Kohn has worked and shown sculpture in Los Angeles, New York, France and Italy. He has been in 16 exhibitions in various art centers of America and Europe and has won 17 prizes.

SCULPTURES ON the theme commemorating the "unknown man and woman who have given their lives or liberty to the cause of human freedom in our time" will be assembled from 56 nations for the final judging in England.
