

### Crane Wrestlers Win Third Match Over Hazel Park

Cranebrook's wrestling team stretched its winning streak in three meets last Friday night by scoring an easy decision over Hazel Park 29-21.

Despite the apparent closeness in the total points, the Blue and Grey had comparatively little trouble winning their third match in four starts. The Crane grapplers, at one stage of the meet, had vaulted to a 29-8 lead and had the match clinched regardless of the outcome of the final three matches.

The high point in the evening was the heavyweight duel between undefeated and untied Doug Richmond of Cranebrook and Bronco Zerfus, number two heavyweight wrestler in Michigan during the past year. Richmond commanded a four point lead at one point in the match, but Zerfus proved his high state ranking by coming from behind and finally pinning the Captain-elect of next year's Crane eleven.

AT THE START of the meet each team traded defaults in the 95 and 105 pound classes. With the score tied 5-5, Cranebrook's Ronald Hummel of Birmingham pinned his mate to give him a record of eight straight points in his last two matches. Blue and Grey Captain, Hushang Wekil, followed this with a decision and next Don Fracassi of Cranebrook won by virtue of a forfeit.

Marvin Davidson then lost a close decision to his Hazel Park opponent to narrow the Crane lead to ten points. Grant Griswold pinned his man to tie Richmond for individual scoring honors at thirteen points.

The only Crane that remained undefeated and untied after this fourth meet was Don Fracassi who won by default against Hazel Park. The Blue and Grey's next match is on February 7 at home when Cranebrook opens its defense of a co-winner Interstate League Wrestling Championship, which University School of Cleveland, The Crane's opponent on that Saturday will be Sturdy Sisk, Academic of Pittsburgh whom the Blue and Grey defeated last year 26-15.

### Science Lessons Open To Schools In B'ham Area

Science students of the Birmingham school district are being offered a new program of demonstrations and discussions at Cranebrook Institute of Science under the direction of Mrs. Doris McMillan who is sponsored by the Birmingham chapter of the AAUW with the cooperation of the Institute.

Open to science classes of public, parochial and independent schools of the district, the special program consists of eight talks and demonstrations from which teachers may select those related to current class study. During visits of the classes to the Cranebrook science museum, Mrs. McMillan will seek to illustrate textbook themes by explaining exhibits and objects from the museum collection.

A graduate of Detroit Teachers College, Mrs. McMillan has taken University of Michigan graduate courses in natural history and is a nature consultant for the Girl Scouts of Detroit. She is also a leader of a Girl Scout troop, a director of the Detroit Audubon Society, and a member of the Michigan Botanical Society.

THE AAUW urges science teachers who wish to use this service to plan at least four visits during the school year, the first to be a tour giving students a general feeling for natural history and an understanding of conservation and the others to consist of detailed studies. Some of the lessons deal with "Avian Architecture," "Spread of Plants," "Weather," and "Continuity of Life."

In addition to the work at the museum, which is the second largest natural history museum in the state, there are 40 exhibits on anthropology, biology, birds, reptiles, mammals and plant life which may be borrowed for use in classrooms. So far classes from Bloomfield Village School, Baldwin School, and Bloomfield Hills School have taken advantage of the new program.

### Port Huron Tops Birmingham Five In Lop-Sided Game

Playing their poorest all-around game to date, the Maple cage team was humbled by Port Huron Friday night 61-42 on the Big Red's home floor. Dick Dailey, shifty Port Huron forward, hit the first basket of the game, giving the Big Red a quick lead. The first part of the half stayed even with both teams unable to get their offenses rolling. However, with Dailey and Tom Anderle hitting long, and Frank Moelzer pushing layups, Port Huron pulled away at halftime 30-18.

The second half started all Huron's, and they soon boosted their lead to 15 points. Here the Maples put on their only rally of the game. With Jim Berger and Gordon Mutch hitting quick buckets, they cut the lead to ten points. The rally was short-lived, however, with Port Huron driving back and turning the game into a rout.

WITH THE score 52-36, the Big Red gave substitutes a chance; and they clicked regularly, flipping in the last nine points.

Port Huron's scoring was well balanced, Dailey getting 17, Anderle 14, and Moelzer 13. Berger pumped in 17 and Mutch 13 to lead Maple scorers.

The most disappointing factor of the game was the Maple's defensive lapse. They fouled unnecessarily and left Port Huron players alone and unharmed, giving them easy lay-up shots. The Maples were also poor offensively, hitting on only 16 per cent of their field goal attempts.
