Hills Garden Club To Hear Lecture By MSC Staffer

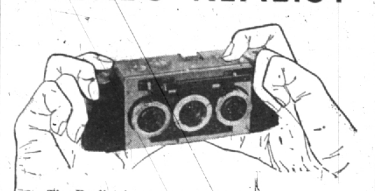
Paul M. Barrett, extension specialist in land and water conservation at Michigan State College, will present a lecture, accompanied with colored slides, at the February 3 meeting of the Bloomfield Hills branch of the Woman's National Farm and Garden Association.

Barrett joined the MSC staff in 1929 as a county agricultural agent. His duties with the college include extension programs of land use with special attention to acquisition and disposition of public lands.
