

OK \$264 Deficiency

Transfer of \$264.97 from the street resurfacing fund to the Chester street paving fund has been approved by Birmingham city commissioners to close out the account. Greater quantities of asphaltic material than called for in the estimates were given as the cause of the deficiency. The commission previously had appropriated \$2,200 for the resurfacing, but the actual cost came to \$2,464.97, according to the city engineer's office.

Plan Board

Birmingham's plan board, at an "extra" meeting Tuesday night, discussed the possible sale of property at the eastern end of Lincoln avenue, adjacent to the Eton Park development.

Robert S. Boatman, city plan board consultant, said the property was not needed in the park plan and could be disposed of. He pointed out that should it be sold for industrial use, it will be screened from all residential properties by the park.

Rites Saturday For Albert Sloo

Albert Gallatin Sloo, 71, guard at the Birmingham National bank for the past 18 years, died New Year's Day in St. Joseph Mercy hospital, Pontiac, after an illness one month.

Mr. Sloo, a resident of Birmingham for 51 years, was one of the city's best known citizens and widely recognized for his knowledge of early Birmingham.

He came to this area as a child, having been born in Knox county, Ind., on Aug. 19, 1881, and although he had traveled widely, had kept Birmingham as his home. He had watched the community grow from a small country village to a bustling residential city, and had taken a deep interest in its affairs although he never sought public office.

During his lifetime here he had gathered much historical data about Birmingham and its duties as bank guard was ever ready to recall the early days of the community he loved so well.

His early life was spent as a farmer, but he later traveled to all sections of the country handling blooded stock at county and state fairs and larger exhibitions such as the Chicago Livestock show.

He began this phase of his career here in 1908. Here, and in the end of others, he was given credit for building up heads and handling them at shows until they attained national and international championship ratings.

He was also, at one time, engaged in selling real estate throughout this section.

The affairs of the First Presbyterian church were of deep interest to Mr. Sloo and he served that body in several capacities. He was, at one time, the benevolent treasurer of the church and had served as an elder and on the board of sessions. He was also a member of the Men's club here.

Mr. Sloo is survived by a widow, the former Ruth Denton, whom he married here in 1923. His only other survivor is a brother, James R. Sloo of Baker.

The body was taken from the Manley Bailey funeral home Saturday for service in the First Presbyterian church with the Rev. Dr. W. Glen Harris officiating. Burial was in Greenwood cemetery.

Her Spalding is listed in the Who's Who of American Women and was a member of the Detroit Women's Club.

In 1910 she married Dr. Edward B. Spalding and they have lived in Detroit since 1919, coming here from Detroit. With her husband, she had offices on West Maple since 1924.

Surviving besides her husband is a daughter, Mrs. Winston T. Sly and three grandchildren.

The body will be at the Bell Chapel, William R. Hamilton Funeral Home until noon Jan. 9 with services at Christ Church Cranbrook at 3 p.m. that afternoon. Cremation will follow at White Chapel Cemetery. The Rev. Robert DeWitt will officiate at the services.

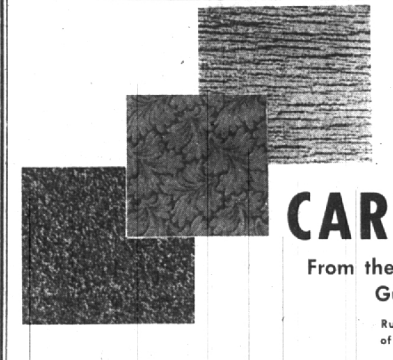
Estimated at \$19,500, the work has been completed at a cost of \$18,716.93, according to City Engineer L. R. Gare.

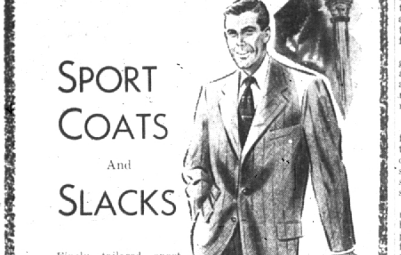
