THE SPEAKER received his bachelor's degree from Leland Stanford University in 1928, his master's degree in the comparative study of religions from Union Theological Seminary in 1929, and a master's degree from Harvard in 1930.

As a Bayard Cutting fellow, Dr. White traveled extensively in Italy and Sicily doing research on the religious history of the 12th century. He received his doctorate in philosophy at Harvard in 1934.

Prior to assuming the presidency of Mills College in 1943, Dr. White taught history at Princeton and Leland Stanford Universities.

He has received honorary degrees and decorations and is a member of Phi Beta Kappa. Dr. White serves in an advisory capacity to a large number of social and civic groups in his native state of California.

In addition to the article mentioned earlier, he is the author of the book "A Challenge to the Colleges," published in 1930.
