'Sculpture As I See It' Is Monday Luncheon Topic

Mrs. C. R. Obermeyer and Mrs. A. K. Toepfer, co-chairmen of the meeting, will present Marshall Fredericks, speaking on "Sculpture as I See It."

In 1952 Fredericks was awarded "The Fine Arts Medal" by the American Institute of Architects. In an article written for the Journal of the American Institute of Architects he states, "We are all aware of the countless instances where the emotional and spiritual beauty of sculpture has fused with the functional and practical forms of architecture, and the two working together have achieved a result far more beautiful than either could have achieved alone."

"This to me is the ideal—the various arts with a common purpose, all working harmoniously toward the accomplishment of a beautiful and functional objective."

Fredericks makes his home on Waddington road.

INTERNATIONALLY KNOWN for his work as a sculptor, Fredericks has studied in Germany, France, Sweden, Great Britain and Italy. For nine years he taught at Cranbrook Academy of Art with the distinguished sculptor, Carl Milles.

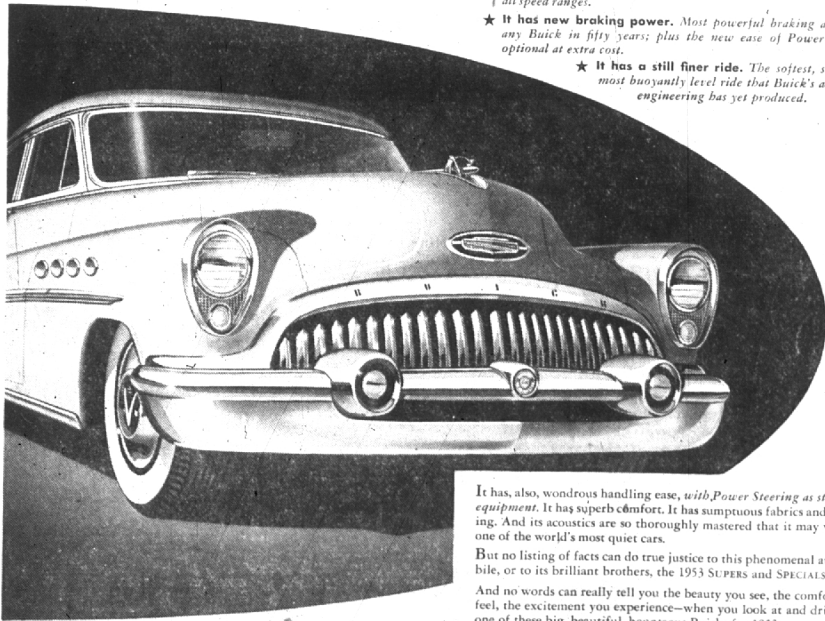

The order of the Eastern Star met at eight o'clock at the Masonic Temple. Refreshments were served after the business meeting.

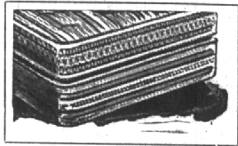
Have You Met . . .
