ALL THESE arrangements would go for naught unless the news got in from the golf course as play went on.

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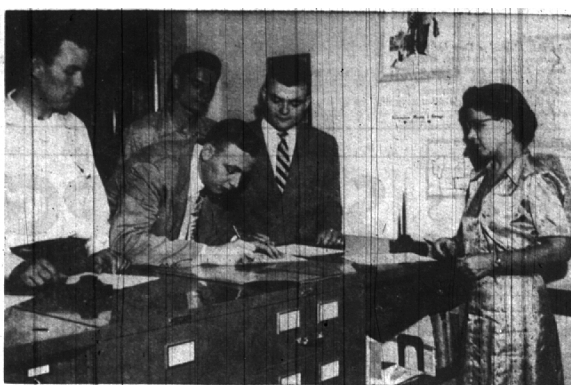

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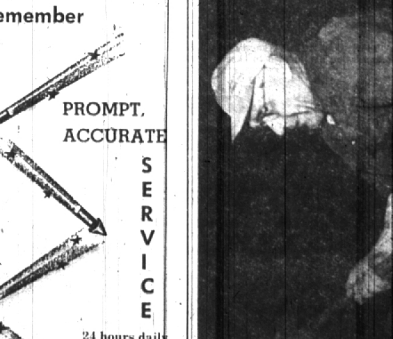
