### Crash Victim Buried Saturday

Services were held in Ludington Saturday afternoon for Hans I. Hansen, 31, of 1656 Grandfield. Hansen was killed early Thursday morning when he crashed his car into the rear of a freighter truck about a mile south of Pontiac on Woodward avenue. He was riding alone and, police believe, had fallen asleep.

James J. King of Dwooso, driver of the truck load of nearly 12 tons weight, said he felt a "bump" and began to pull off to the side of the road. He found Hansen's car wedged under the rear of the truck. Mr. Hansen, a tool designer for the Leading Engine company, had been a resident of Birmingham for about two years.

HE WAS BORN in Ludington on October 5, 1921 and attended the public schools there. He was a member of Bethany Methodist church.

He is survived by his widow, Virginia M. Hansen; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Hans I. Hansen, Sr., of Ludington; a stepson, Thomas Greenwald and seven brothers and sisters all of Ludington.

The body was transferred from the Paul Snover funeral home in Pontiac to the Eye home in Ludington. Burial was in Lakeview cemetery there.

CATHY LYNN RUPPRECHT, 24-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. William A. Rupprecht, 1658 Webster, died at her home July 24.

Resides her parents the baby is survived by a sister, Deborah, her paternal grandmother, Mrs. Julia W. Rupprecht of New Brunswick, N. J., and her maternal grandmother, Mrs. H. H. Nelson of Pontiac.
