

Tells How He Has Applied Rotary Aims

How he has applied the principles of Rotary to his business and community life was outlined to Birmingham Rotarians Monday night by George E. Averill, the club's first president and only past district governor.

He said Rotary has set up the mechanics of what and how to be of service to fellowmen, then declared, "There are many things we can do voluntarily."

"Some of the world's most wonderful works are a direct result of such voluntary service. We need more of it to bring us closer to the perfect world."

AVERILL, who also is editor and publisher of The Birmingham Economic, reminded a bit on the club's formation 29 years ago.

"The thing that pleases me most," he said, "is not the bank account I may have but the friends which I have—many of them due to Rotary."

"He believes us to keep our friendships in good repair, as well as make new ones; so we won't find ourselves all alone."
