

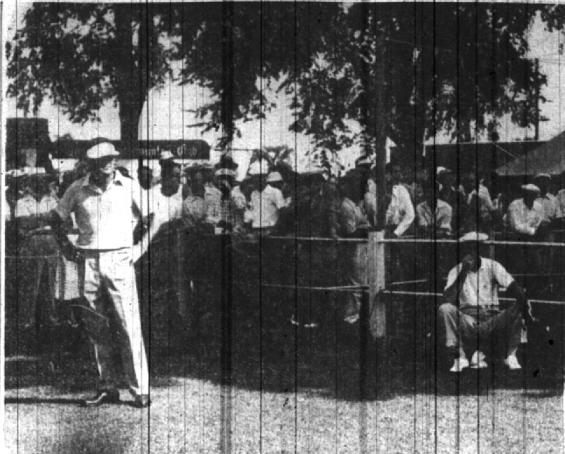
# NOTICE OF ANNUAL MEETING

CITY OF BIRMINGHAM, MICHIGAN NOTICE TO PROPERTY OWNERS VACATION AND RELOCATION OF E. LINCOLN & SHEFFIELD ROAD

Notice is hereby given that a meeting will be held in the Commission Room of the Municipal Building on Monday, July 20, 1953, at 1:00 P.M. to hear objections to the proposed vacating and relocating of Lincoln and Sheffield Roads.

This notice is published in accordance with Chapter 11, Section 2 of the Charter of the City of Birmingham, and Resolution No. 47 (1951).

Resolution No. 47A Moved by Commissioner Watkins.

Whereas, the City Planning Board has recommended that Lincoln Avenue be straightened east of Eton Avenue;

Whereas, plans for the improvement of Eton Park are based upon relocation of Lincoln Avenue; and

Whereas, a vacation of a portion of Lincoln Avenue and Sheffield Road is necessary to accomplish the relocation;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT HEREBY ORDAINED, that a public hearing be held on Monday, July 20, 1953, at 1:00 P.M. in the Municipal Building for the purpose of considering vacation of portions of E. Lincoln Avenue and Sheffield Road described as follows:

Property located in Sheffield Estates 21, a subdivision of part of section 21, T. 2 N. R. 11 E., 7th Township, Oakland County, Michigan, as recorded in Volume 44 of Public Acts of the Oakland County Register of Deeds, Ordinance particularly described as follows:

That portion of Lincoln Avenue abutting lots 499-504, inclusive, and being north of a line 140 ft. south of and parallel to the north line of lots 499-502, inclusive as extended;

That portion of Lincoln Avenue bounded on the east by the easterly line of lot 504 extended southerly, on the south by the southerly right-of-way line of Lincoln Avenue as platted 80 ft. wide on the west by the westerly line of lot 502 extended southerly and on the north by a line 500 ft. south of and parallel to the southerly line of lots 499-502, inclusive as extended;

That portion of Lincoln Avenue bounded on the west by the westerly line of lot 504 extended southerly, and on the east by a line 140 ft. south of and parallel to the easterly line of the Sheffield Estates, Subdivision 21;

That portion of Sheffield Road bounded on the east by a line 40 ft. west of and parallel to the easterly line of Sheffield Estates Subdivision 21, on the north by the southerly line of Lincoln Avenue extended easterly, on the west by the easterly line of lot 502 on the north by the southerly line of lot 504 extended southerly and on the east by the easterly line of the Sheffield Estates, Subdivision 21;

It is Further Resolved that at the time the above property be vacated, that a public hearing will be held in the Commission Room of the Municipal Building, to consider an amendment to Ordinance No. 21, known as the Ordinance, re-vacating a portion of a triangle of property bounded on the north by Lots 3, 4 and 5 of Greenfield Terrace; on the east by Koon Road and on the west by the Grand Trunk Western Railroad; to a building, family residence classification, retaining the following property in a single residence family classification:

Lot 31 Birmingham Estates Subdivision and that portion of vacated Yorkshire lying between Koon Road and the G. T. W. R. R.

Lots 40, 41, 42, 138, 141 and 210 all of Birmingham Estates Subdivision.

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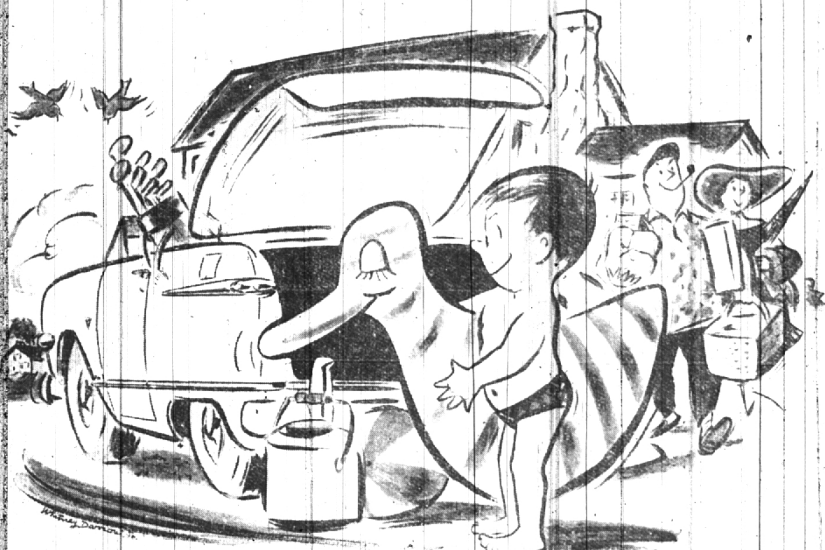
