BASS RIVERS IN MICHIGAN
On a recent "Michigan Outdoors" television program Professor Karl Lagler of the School of Natural Resources, University of Michigan, came up with an idea that bears careful consideration on behalf of Michigan anglers—particularly those with a love for black bass. Professor Lagler says were overlooking a good bet by failing to establish and encourage small-mouth bass in many Michigan rivers. While a good deal of the sportmen's money goes toward the rearing and planting of trout in northern streams, our "warm water" hatchery activities are almost at a standstill. Professor Lagler calls this unfair to a very large group of fishermen confined to the lakes and rivers of southern Michigan.

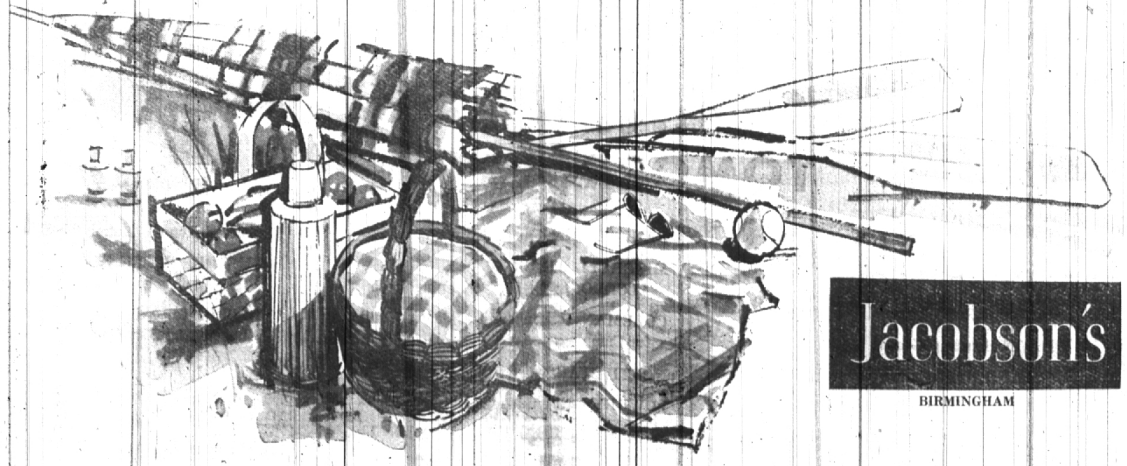
