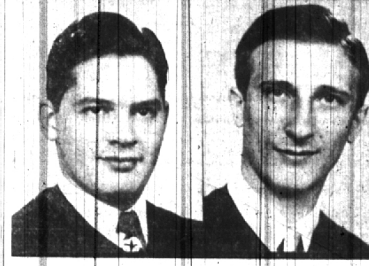

Anderson is listed to receive the bachelor of science degree in accounting; and Miss Limp, the bachelor of arts degree in home economics.

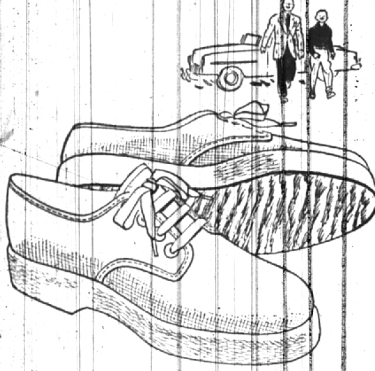
