MICHIGAN OUTDOORS
with MORT NIFF

GREAT LAKES BASS
Sometimes it takes the non-resident sportsman to find out where the best fishing in Michigan is available. Such is the case with Great Lakes bass. Both small and large mouths. During the first two weeks of the season which opens June 20th you'll find Ohio anglers galore along coast. Along shore lines of certain Great Lakes, wading and floating in what usually amounts to a most successful search for black bass. To be sure you'll meet Michigan fishermen there, too, but they'll be outnumbered.

Choice Spots
There are rocky reefs for those who confine them in Lake Erie between Mohr and Toledo. Water here is deeper than 3 to 4 feet over these shoals this year, and with warmer water temperatures in this shallow lake bass will have completed spawning, and will be on the feed.

But better fishing is to the north. From Harbor Beach around to Caswell the shoreline of the Thumb is some sweet home to herds of big bass—almost all small-mouth in that area. To be specific about where to go, there's a rock and shale formation just off Port Hope which always attracts the fish. During the early part of the season, Crawfish scum along the shore really attracts the fish. During the scumming a goodly number are hooked up by bass, moving into a former Birmingham resident, Mort Niff's "Michigan Outdoors" television show appears every Thursday at 10 p.m. over station WVJ-TV.
