A special Athletic Assembly was held at Cranbrook School, Monday June 9, to award the varsity letters to twelve members of this year's baseball squad. Leading the parade of winners was Captain Bill Soter who had a record of seven wins and three losses through the season.

The most notable fact concerning Soter was that he struck out 145 batters in 89 innings of pitching. Soter either started or relieved in all but three games in this year's schedule. He earned a .317 average with a low 1.18 and his losses were to Birmingham, Hamtramck, and Ferndale.

Captain Elect for 1954 is Don Slotkin, a Detroit boy who observed the third base position. Don played all 18 games for the Cranes, collecting 16 hits, scoring 14 runs, and hitting .353, the highest average among the regulars. Slotkin was the leading slugger in the team, getting two doubles among his 18 hits.
