First grade—We are going to have a picnic over at Patsy Little's house. We will be able to swim over there. It will be on June 16.

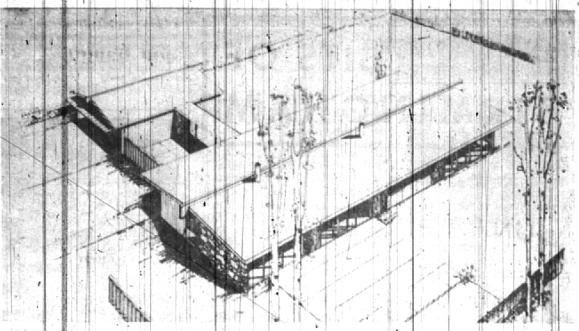
Second grade—Miss Poff's from Yesterday we went to Cranbrook Institute of Science. We saw the rock collection. Some boys and girls brought rocks.

Friday is Blue and White day where two teams do things and may the best team win.

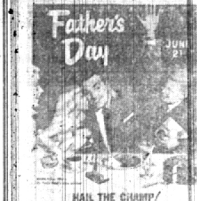

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Rental Boats in County Undergoing Inspections

Rental boats in Oakland county are being inspected by Capt. Frank Van Atta, according to Sheriff Clarence L. Hubbard.

Hubbard said today the inspections are being made under the direction of the Michigan Waterways Commission which requires all boats and canoes, offered for rent, undergo annual checks. Van Atta, he said, is being assisted by Sgt. Donald Francis.

Inspections include checking the general condition of the craft, see that oars and outboard are sound and secured to the boat so they cannot fall out or be stolen, sails on motor-powered craft for emergency case, bowline of proper length and strength for towing when boat is loaded to capacity, and proper identification tags.

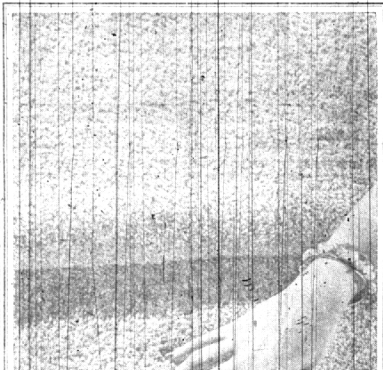
Residents between Adams and Edin originally petitioned for the restrictions against trucks, but commissioners would not agree that this step was advisable.
