Various city officials will join members of the Oakland Hospital board of trustees for ground-breaking ceremonies at the hospital's site, Thirteenth and Cordillie, Royal Oak Friday morning, June 19, at 9:45 a.m. The O. W. Burke company, Detroit, will begin construction of the 48,000 building immediately.

City to Make Counter-Offer In Zoning Case

The city and the Pembroke Manor Subdivision association this week will make a counter-offer to the Industrial Land Co., Frank Newell, and others regarding the rezoning of an 11-acre triangular parcel between the Grand Trunk right-of-way and Eton road.

Representatives of the city, which together with the subdivision group are defendants in a case now before Circuit Judge Frank Doty, are agreed that the area should have single-family residences along the Eton road frontage, and multiple family zoning for the remaining nine acres to the rear and up to the railroad.

HOWEVER, THE subdivision group and the city commission indicate they would readily agree to a compromise settlement if the dwelling units were terraced instead of 3-story multiple units, as the plaintiffs propose.

The Industrial Land Co., which is a subsidiary of the GTWR, and other plaintiffs have instituted court proceedings seeking to force the city to rezone the property, claiming it no longer is desirable for single homes.

If the city loses the case, it can appeal the court's decision or hold hearings and rezone the area to a less restrictive classification. The defendants have until June 22 to work out a compromise or proceed with the trial.

Miss Wadlock, brought to Bloomfield by Mrs. Winston Guest, is another coming from the Gross Pointe show. She was the champion, ridden hunter champion at that show in 1952.

Flick's Peak, owned by C. D. Pierce of Bloomfield and Metamora, Va., by Mr. and Mrs. Robert Hurke, Pike's Peak, like Captain Fritz Bay, owned by Mr. and Mrs. Gentry, is now at Gross Pointe. Both have appeared at the Bloomfield show before.

ANOTHER INNOVATION for the 1953 show will be a junior elementary dressage class, where young riders will be judged for horsemanship alone. Winners in this class will receive medals and the privilege of riding in the Madison Square Garden shows.

The event will be judged by Jack P. Gallagher, Jr. of Norcrossville. Other Judges include George B. Elliott, Toronto, hunters and jumpers; Richard M. Carter, Scarsdale, N. Y., hunters and jumpers; equitation; C. Guy Grimm, Hudson, Ohio; saddle horses, equitation; Col. Harold C. Kitchner, LaGrange, Ill., western horses, equitation.

AMONG THE Birmingham area people active in show plans are BOB vice president J. R. Davis, treasurer Ray E. Lawlor, assistant secretaries Mrs. Irving A. Duffy and Mrs. C. M. Heible, and committeemen Harry S. Nichols and Dr. John R. Hubert.

"There is one erroneous impression we would like to correct," Mrs. Duffy said Monday. "The show is open to the public and is in no way confined to club membership, alone. Anyone is welcome at any or all of the shows."

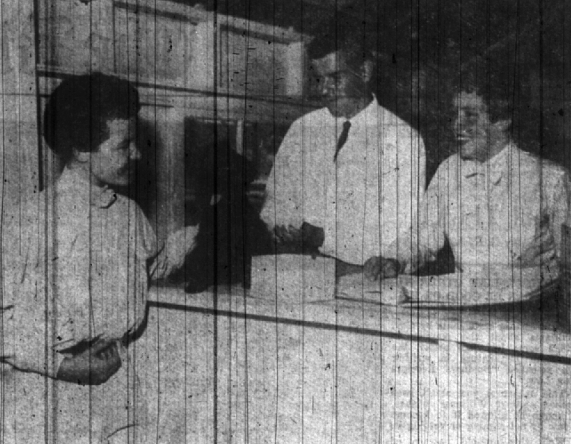

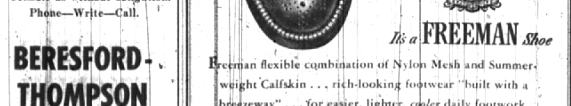
