6 large baking apples
1 1/2 cups brown sugar
3/4 cup broken walnut meats
1 tsp strong coffee
Whipped cream
Select 6 large apples. Care Peel about 1/2 of the way down from stem end. Combine a half cup of gently with sugar and baste with brown sugar and broken walnut syrup until apples are glazed meats. Fill apples with this mixture. Set in baking pan. Combine
