Editor's Letter Among the Items In Cornerstone

An interesting letter was found among the items in the cornerstone box removed last week during the remodeling of St. James Episcopal church.

Dated June 25, 1895, the letter was written by A. Whitehead, owner and publisher of The Birmingham Eccentric with George Mitchell. The letter reads:

"Everybody's business is nobody's business, so the business of putting appropriate things in the Corner Stone of St. James church devolves on one of two. And as it seems a pity that there should be so little said about the affairs of the church, I take the liberty of saying here and now, the officers of the church; society are as follows:

BOARD OF Vestrymen: E. G. Stevenson, J. E. Quick, J. Allen Bigelow, William Galt, Clark Blumberg, Martin Meyer, E. R. Wilcox, H. C. Wilson and Almeron Whitehead. **OFFICERS:** E. G. Stevenson, president; Almeron Whitehead, secretary-treasurer.

"When these articles are again brought to light, may the good Lord cause the finders to give a few silent prayers to the memories of the men who did the best they could."

Also included in the contents was a copy of an 1890 Catalogue for Crescent Bicycles and Cycle for Lovell Diamond cycles, both bearing the mark of "A. Whitehead, Birmingham, Michigan."

An issue of The Birmingham Eccentric, dated May 22, 1953, and an article on the church, a June 21, 1953 copy of the Detroit Free-press (see) was also included.

Redeemer to Host Mission Society From Detroit Area
