The Birmingham American Legion team of the Charles Edwards Post suffered its first loss of the season to its new neighbor in the league, Bloomfield Hills, Friday, June 19, at Cranbrook.

The Bloomfield team collected 11 hits off starter Tom McCormick to best Birmingham 8-1. Goldman was the winning hurler.

McCormick was relieved in the sixth by Jerry Wedge after Bloomfield had scored four runs in the fifth inning.

In an earlier game Wednesday, June 17, Birmingham edged Clawson 2-1 in a pitching duel at Pierce field. Sheldon was the winning pitcher in this game but had to be helped in the fifth by McCormick because of a sore back muscle. Sheldon and McCormick fanned

14 Clawson batters. Pawlow was the loser in a game in which each team gained five hits.

BIRMINGHAM scored both runs in the fourth inning on a single hit. Mike Groves opened the inning with a walk and went to second on a ground out by Jerry Wedge. Tom Beck reached first safely on a fielder's choice when Clawson infielders unsuccessfully tried to get Groves. Bill Watkinson then supplied the power with a double, scoring both runs.

Sunday, June 21, Birmingham batters blanked Berkeley 10-0 as they pounded out 17 hits. Sheldon was the winning hurler again as he added 16 strike-outs to his record. Becker, the leading pitcher,

was relieved in the second by C. Burkart.

Bill Watkinson was the game's best hitter, getting two singles, a triple and a home run in five trips to the plate.

Shortstop Tom Beck was credited with the most outstanding play in the game when he went far to his left on a grounder by J. Burkart and rifled his throw to first to rob the hitter of possibly an extra base hit.

Services were Wednesday afternoon from Bell Chapel of the William R. Hamilton company with burial in White Chapel cemetery.



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
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
